### 2015 Genealogy Conference in Windsor, August 2015

This is not for lack of interest from potential attendees; rather it is the general change in the genealogical market that has moved focus and financial support away from conferences. We had hoped to use sponsorship money to enhance the conference with high profile key note speakers and special events but, despite our best efforts we have not received the support we need. The pressing schedule of advance payments required by the hotel which puts our East Surrey Family History Society funds at risk has forced the issue and we have had to make a decision.

I am sorry we cannot proceed and I'd like to thank those organisations who have backed us which include the Society of Genealogists, the Halsted Trust, FamilySearch, ABM publishing (Family Tree magazine), Mickleprint (who print this Journal), Parliamentary Archives, University of Strathclyde, Berkshire Family History Society and the Surrey History Centre.

### **Sutton Archives WW1 letters blog**

Kath Shawcross, Borough Archivist & Local Studies Manager at Sutton Archives has written to tell us about a “real time” blog they’re producing of WW1 letters written by Jack Widdicombe, home to his parents. Jack came from Carshalton and Wallington and was initially based at Bisley for his training before going to France in early November 1914. ### **The Commonwealth War Graves Commission - ‘Discover 14-18’**

The site from the Commonwealth War Graves Commission is well known for help in finding the final resting places of the 1,700,000 men and women who died in both the World Wars in some 153 countries across the world.

The CWGC’s new website, Discover 14-19 [www.cwgc.org/Discover1418](http://www.cwgc.org/Discover1418) now adds more historical information for the First World War. The site will continue to develop over the centenary to help you discover more about the conflict, and where those who died are commemorated today.

The Discover tab opens up detailed information about The Home Front, Gallipoli, The Battle of the Somme, The Ypres Salient, War in the Air and War at Sea. These in turn lead to information on the cemeteries and memorials and histories of the campaigns, all very well written and illustrated.

The timeline is what it says on the tin, but again has superb illustrations. The Trails feature suggests themed journeys retracing the steps of the Allied soldiers. At the time of writing this piece, The Retreat from Mons Remembrance Trail is the only one covered, 250 miles taking 2-3 days. But Gallipoli and Loos may have been added by the time you read this.

This is a well thought through, informative and respectful resource and a worthwhile adjunct to the familiar CWGC website.

## **WWI from Above**

First broadcast on BBC1 on 7 November 2010, the BBC's *World War One from Above* has been broadcast several times since, mainly on BB4, and more recently on the Yesterday channel.

The documentary, presented by Fergal Keane, tells the story of the Great War from a unique new aerial perspective. Based on two remarkable historical finds, including archive footage filmed from an airship in summer 1919, capturing the trenches and battlefields in a way that have rarely been seen before. It also features aerial photographs taken by First World War pilots - developed for the first time in over ninety years - that show not only the devastation inflicted during the fighting, but also twists of fate and human stories visible only from above.

The French pilot of the airship, Jacques Trolley de Prévaux whose story is also included, was executed, together with his wife, by the Germans in World War Two for working in the French Resistance. Their daughter, who knew nothing of his film work, is introduced to it at the end of the documentary – incredibly moving.

The documentary is sure to be shown many more times during the centenary commemorations. Look out for it – it is an unknown story and quite extraordinary.

## **Surrey History Centre – Heritage Lottery Fund Project Update**

Phil Cooper, 'Exploring Surrey's Past' Officer at SHC, [phil.cooper@surreycc.gov.uk](mailto:phil.cooper@surreycc.gov.uk) has advised us that their bid for the second stage of the First World War Project '*Surrey in the Great War: A County Remembers*' has been delivered to the Heritage Lottery Fund. They hope to have a decision by early 2015 and will then be able to start on the project.

He says, 'We have developed a structure for the planned website and have a working model for the searchable database which will contain all the information about the people who have a Great War connection with Surrey. The database is linked in to the county's Historic Environment Record so war memorials will be flagged up on any planning applications taking place in the local area'.

'A new element in the planned project is the digitisation and indexing of a range of Surrey newspapers from the 1914-22 period. A great resource for anyone researching Surrey in the Great War period.'


### POW Records held by the International Red Cross

Thanks to Peter Heather for sending me this.

'You may know this already, but in the last few days the International Red Cross have finally released the records they hold of POWs in the First World War (they would only respond to specific enquiries before and at some cost). The record cards are digitised and often contain detailed information about the prisoner and his whereabouts etc. There are also record cards for soldiers who are missing and where the family have asked the Red Cross whether they are a prisoner. All too often the soldier had been killed and was not a prisoner so there is no further information, but the cards do detail the information that the family had given about their soldier, so can be useful and shows that the records aren't limited to POWs. The good news is that the website is free and the search page is at <http://grandeguerre.icrc.org/en/File/Search>.

It's a great site and I finally managed to find out where my uncle (he was a lot older than my aunt!) was imprisoned. Here's a shot of the front of his card as an example. There's even more information on the accompanying records'

I found the website a little unusual to navigate but got the hang of it reasonably quickly. The word 'Validate' in the red box is the 'ENTER' command; the tiny white oblong on the far right is the Up/Down scroll cursor and I had to set the screen size at 50% to see all the name options on the left hand side and to scroll the images in the central pane. Well worth the effort! Thanks Peter.
