





Missing Census returns

My thanks to Peter Calver (Lost Cousins) for this piece from his latest newsletter. <http://lostcousins.com/newsletters2/latesept16news.htm>

He says: “There’s a very useful page at the Findmypast website which lists the parts of the England & Wales and Scotland censuses which are known to be missing - you’ll find it [here](#) (you don’t need to be a Findmypast subscriber to view the page).”

(Ed.: I was sorry to see that my local parish Malden, Surrey, is missing from the 1841 Census.)

“Note: information has been recovered from some of the water-damaged records from the 1851 Census for the Manchester area, and can be found at [Ancestry](#) (there are about 165,000 additional names).”

Most of the missing material is from the 1841-1871 Censuses. There are short summaries at the end of the listing for the later Censuses (see screenshot below). The only missing piece from the 1881 Census is for part of Cunard Street in Camberwell – sorry if this is your family! 1891 and 1911 are complete.

1881 England, Wales & Scotland Census

The [1881 England, Wales & Scotland Census](#) was taken on the night of 3 April 1881 and gave the total population as 29,707,207.

Piece number 693 is missing from the 1881 census: house numbers 17-22 Cunard Street, Camberwell, London.

Part of house number 16 could be missing too if the house contained more children, a boarder or a visitor.

1891 England, Wales & Scotland Census

When [1891 England, Wales & Scotland Census](#) was taken on April 5th, the total population of England, Wales and Scotland was recorded as 33,015,701.

The census is available in full, with no known missing pieces.

1901 England, Wales & Scotland Census

The [1901 England, Wales & Scotland Census](#) was taken on 31 March and gave the total population as 36,967,126.

The village of Deal in Kent is missing in its entirety from the 1901 census. There are no known copies available.

1911 Census For England & Wales

The [1911 Census For England & Wales](#) is available in full, with the original household pages and summary books available to view. There are 36 million records for those who were living in England and Wales on 2 April 1911.

There are no transcripts or images available for Scotland.

Census for England, Wales and Scotland: missing pieces

For a variety of reasons the census returns for England & Wales 1841-1911 and the census returns for Scotland 1841-1901 are incomplete and have pieces missing. The later the census was taken, the more information is available for us to explore. For instance, the 1841 census is missing parishes from eleven counties in England, but the 1891 census is only missing some house numbers. Our collection of the 1911 census is complete for England and Wales, but no transcripts or images are available for this year for Scotland.

If you are having trouble finding your ancestor we recommend that you consult these lists to find if your relative's parish is missing from the official records.

1841 England, Wales & Scotland Census

The [1841 England, Wales & Scotland Census](#) is the first modern UK census and the earliest census that has survived in its entirety. A small number of permanent gaps exist in the 1841 census. In the enumeration books the following parishes and hamlets are permanently missing from these piece numbers. Some of these parishes and hamlets represent the entirety of the piece, while others are just portions of a piece.



Peter Brown Family History

My Family History Homepage

The families associated with the Peter Brown Family History lived in ENGLAND, primarily in Sussex, Surrey, Kent and Yorkshire. Genealogy family tree information is provided using pedigrees & ancestry charts and family group descriptions.

This comprehensive web site focuses on Brown (or Browne) families who lived in Mid Sussex, South East Surrey and South West Kent. The main related families include Bleadell, Bees, Comber, Colegate, David, Deacon, Fenderson, Fiddicks, Green, Infield, Mills, Payne, Skilley, Stripp, Tiley, Underhill and Wisking. There are also Blead, Debona, Rhodes and Spright families from Yorkshire.

The main parishes were East Grinstead, Farningham & West Hoarkey (in Sussex) and Cobham, Horsham, Lingfield, Lingfield & Oxted (in Surrey) and Edenbridge (in Kent). The related families of most of the wives of the Brown families also come from these parishes or adjacent ones (including Hatfield, Worth (Ss), Oxted, Bantror (Ss) and Croydon (Ss)). For about 500 years, all main families (except Bees) came from and lived in an area of the country about 12 miles by 18 miles.

The other main branch of the family tree is the Spright family tree which originates (with its associated related families of wives) from Yorkshire & Durham, England, in particular in the parishes of Eastropville, Leath, Middleborough, Kestwell (A. Oulton), South, Woodrick & Threapry.

Family Groups, Pedigree & Ancestry Charts

The basic of the web site is to focus on Family Groups, which is a family that had a grandparent of Peter Brown at its head. The family group shows children & grandchildren both details, personal history, documents

News

Representative Church Body Library has relaunched its online List of Church of Ireland Parish Registers. The list accounts for all Church of Ireland parochial registers of baptism, marriage and burial – noting what survives, the dates covered, and where they are located. Where registers were destroyed in the burning of the Public Record Office of Ireland (PROI) during the Irish Civil War in 1922, the list records details about abstracts and transcripts and where they are held. In its new online version, the list has been reformatted into an accessible colour-coded resource. Additionally, it now includes live links to other websites holding indexes, transcripts and scanned images of parish registers. It will continue to be free to researchers.



JOHN HYMAS. I am a butcher, and son-in-law to Mrs. Brice. As I was going out of the parlour-door from tea, I saw the shop-door open, and the prisoner rush out; I pursued, and brought him back. He had a quantity of leather—I gave him in charge.

GUILTY. Aged 13.
Of Stealing, but not of breaking and entering.
Transported for Seven Years.
Second Middlesex Jury, before Mr. Recorder.

273. THOMAS TURNER was indicted for feloniously breaking and entering the dwelling-house of Charles Florey, about ten o'clock in the forenoon of the 9th of January (he and others of his family being therein), with intent to steal, and stealing therein three petticoats, value 30s., the goods of James Newman.
SARAH NEWMAN. I lodge in Mr. Florey's front kitchen. On Thursday morning I put the petticoats in the back kitchen to dry; I left the window shut, and locked the door, and gave the key to the landlady, as she, and the other lodgers, dry their things there also. Next evening I went there, and missed them—I do not know when they were taken.
CHARLES FLOREY. I am the landlord of the house. On Thursday and Friday I saw the window shut down.
MARY FLOREY. I had the key of the back kitchen, and saw the things safe on Thursday evening. I put the key in the shop.


